

OEC / NGA Partnership History









Focus: In 2016 NGA launched a policy academy to assist 5 states with creating a strategic roadmap that identified goals and objectives for establishing and/or strengthening emergency communications governance bodies.

Approach: 5 states (Alaska, Hawaii, Illinois, Utah and West Virginia) were selected to attend the 2 day Policy Academy after submitting applications during a competitive selection process

Intended Outcomes:

- Establish or reinvigorate, an active governance body to ensure consensus, coordination and support
- Revitalize the SCIP (Statewide Communication Interoperability Plan) with a messaging strategy that informs executive decision makers
- Engage the legislature to promote understanding and long-term support of the SCIP
- Empower the SWIC (Statewide Interoperability Coordinator) and ensure close coordination among the SWIC, Broadband Single Point of Contact and the State 9-1-1 Administrator



Phase II (Current): Regional Workshops

Focus: Conduct four regional workshops bringing together state officials to develop strategic roadmaps to enhance governance for public safety communications

<u>Goal</u>: 35 states/territories participation (To date: 3 workshops with 26 states participating)

Intended Outcomes:

- Improved understanding of the importance and complexity of emergency communications systems and interoperability now and in the future
- Increased awareness of role and need for a full time SWIC/Communications Champion within states
- Sharing of best practices among states related to interoperability and governance
- Development of state-specific roadmaps to integrate disparate systems through governance with actionable, specific implementation plans and measurable goals
- · Enhanced relationships to improve interstate and intrastate collaboration
- Engage senior state leadership to foster understanding and gain champions for funding, legislative issues and general leadership cooperation

 - January 17-18, 2018, New Orleans, LA
 - March 20-21, 2018, Albuquerque, NM
 - May 16-17, 2018, Portland, OR
- 1 Planned
 - July 25-26, 2018, Philadelphia, PA



NGA Regional Workshop #1 - Southeast

- 8 States in Attendance
- Full participation by SWICs and a variety of other stakeholders
- Action Plans:
 - 4 states plan to pursue new legislation
 - 3 states identified steps for NG911 planning
 - 3 states are focusing on keeping LMR as a funding priority, and promoting technology and education
 - 2 states are implementing statewide radio systems
 - 2 states will work on lifecycle planning



NGA Regional Workshop #2 - Southwest

- 7 States in Attendance
- Increased participation of 911 to equal that of SWICs to encourage cross planning
- Action Plans:
 - 5 states are going to pursue new legislation
 - 4 states will develop a SIGB charter
 - 4 states are going to get more organized around NG911 planning
 - 2 states are planning statewide radio systems
 - 4 states talked about identifying political champions



NGA Regional Workshop #3 - Northwest

- 11 States in Attendance
- Full participation by SWICs, high number of 911, Chief Information Office participants, and SPOCs to provide a more holistic planning approach
- Action Plans:
 - 4 states will identify funding streams for long-term funding of the SWIC, SPOC, SIGB, and their overall program
 - 3 states will get more organized around NG911 planning including funding considerations
 - 4 states are going to get more organized around NG911 planning
 - 2 states will identify a funding stream for LMR



NGA Regional Workshop – Attendance by State




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NGA Regional Workshop - How Many Attended / Plan To Attend

- Consistent high attendance from SWICs and SPOCs/Broadband Representatives
- Worked over the course of each workshop to increase 911, IT, legislative, and Governors Office representatives
- Most effective states brought a good cross-section of participants



NGA Regional Workshop Findings Top State Challenges

Top Five Challenge Areas (# of Southeast/Southwest/Northwest States Identifying the Challenge (of 27))

- 1. Coordination with Locals (13 States)
 - Local authority over grant dollars, home rule, and lack of active participation in the SIGB are challenges for statewide coordination
 - Lack clear incentives for participation
- 2. Legislative Support, Exposure, and Education (11 States)
 - Important for continued funding and authority
 - In many states, SWIC or 911 Administrator cannot interact directly with legislators





Top Five Challenge Areas (# of Southeast/Southwest/Northwest States Identifying the Challenge (of 27)) Continued

- 3. SIGB Membership (11 States)
 - Lack of participation, participant stagnation, and influential members sending non-influential proxies are continued challenges
 - Some states still don't have a SIGB
- 4. Consolidated and Coordinated Governance (11 States)
 - 911 is often governed separately from the SIGB
 - Created governance silos in many states
- 5. Executive Branch Support, Exposure and Education (8 States)
 - Concerns about loss of momentum with Administration changes and best ways to ensure seamless transition

State Implementation Assistance:

- Development of a Governance Roadmap and Implementation Plan for each state
- Follow-up meetings with each state every two months by OEC Coordinators and the OEC Strategic Integration Office (SIO)

Idaho State Representative who attended Northwest Regional Workshop recognized the importance of the SWIC role during the workshop and has committed to pursue full funding for SWIC in the next legislative session.



Kansas developed legislation during the workshop that has passed both the House and the Senate. Governor Colyer on May 10, 2018, signed the legislation. The SWIC is currently implementing new legislation.



Missouri set up a comprehensive action plan during the workshop and has already received wide support for a SIGB Charter.

Structure


- Senate Bill 1112 (2016), established the Land Mobile Radio Public Safety Interoperability Cooperative
